PRESIDENTS LETTER

ANNE DENNY

Hello again and Happy Spring. With all the bare ground showing, for now, it appears that Spring is well on its way. And with Spring comes construction, although the past few seasons have found no definitive boundaries between last year's construction season and this one. With technology and demand comes the ability and need for year round building. In previous years, at least in Alaska, there was a definite end to the season. You couldn't find a mason or carpenter from October to April. Winters were a time for vacation, equipment repair and bidding on new jobs for the next year. If your excavation and concrete work weren't in by October, then that job was next year's project.

With an extended building season, we are getting more and more like the lower 48 States. Finding qualified workers is getting to be quite the problem in the construction industry nationwide. That is why programs like NAWIC's 'Block Kids' are so important. We must endeavor to teach our youth that the construction industry has so many opportunities that other occupations don't. A skilled tradesman or woman can expect to make a very good salary, even at the apprentice level. With the growing expense of higher education, a child graduating from high school can get into an apprenticeship program and start earning good money right away. If they desire, they can at a later date continue their education with a good grasp of the industry and a skilled trade to fall back on. This fact is often overlooked in schools and by parents. The world has its share of professional sports figures, movie stars, doctors and lawyers. What we really need are more people who can build the arenas, movie halls, hospitals and courthouses. Many thanks to our Block Kids crew and all their efforts to bring the idea of construction into our schools. A special thanks to Tamie Taylor for resurrecting the program and finding a group of enthusiastic volunteers carry it out.

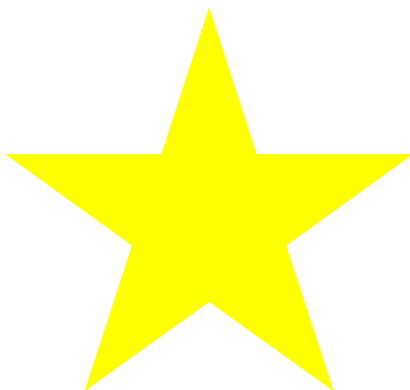

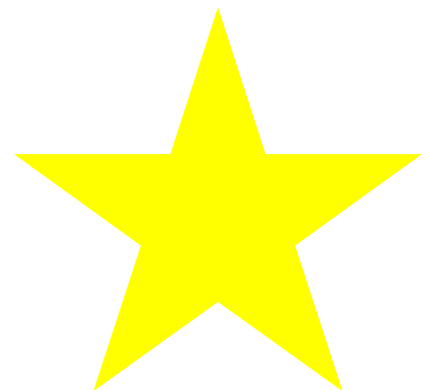

APRILS' MEETING INFORMATION



Dr. Doug North, President, Alaska Pacific University

“A Decade of Rebuilding Alaska Pacific University”

This year, Dr. Doug North is celebrating 10 years as President of Alaska Pacific University. In 1995, APU was experiencing declining enrollment and serious financial troubles. Today, the school is experiencing its highest enrollment ever and is ranked #52 in U.S. News & World Report’s Guide to America’s best western colleges. APU has adopted a theme of “active learning” throughout the institution, where learning is student driven, hands-on and project oriented.

Highly successful programs at APU today include:

- ✓ An Early Honors program that allows high school seniors to complete their last year of high school and their first year of college simultaneously.
- ✓ The Rural Alaska Native Adult Distance Education Program (RANA), allowing Alaskans to earn a college certificate or degree while living in their own community.
- ✓ Membership in a new Eco League, a collaboration with five other similar colleges offering strong Environmental Science, Environmental Studies, Marine Biology and Outdoor Studies curriculum. Students and faculty within the Eco League will work together and have the option of traveling to other member schools for a semester.
- ✓ A new Health Service Administration program, offering masters and undergraduate studies to those involved in hospital management.

From 2003 to 2008, APU has plans for several major capital improvement projects, totaling nearly \$10 million, including renovations to Grant Hall and the construction of a new dorm in 2005.

After hearing Dr. North speak, members of NAWIC hopefully will have a better understanding of what happens at the “other college” in town, how APU’s approach to teaching is different than that of a publicly funded university and the impact the college is having on Anchorage’s construction industry.

Speaker Bio

Dr. Douglas North

President, Alaska Pacific University

Dr. Doug North has been president of Alaska Pacific University since 1995. Prior to that, he was the president of Prescott College in Arizona. He also has been a director of development, director of special academic projects and a professor of literature at Goddard College in Vermont. He holds a Ph.D in English from Syracuse University.

North has been the driving force behind a decade of building and growth at APU. He was instrumental in founding several new programs at APU including the Early Honors program, Rural Alaska Native Adult program and a new venture – the EcoLeague.

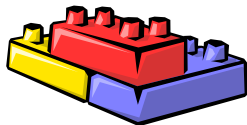

His hobbies include hiking, kayaking, skiing, tennis, Spanish language and literature.

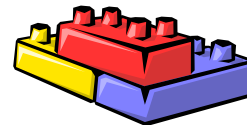

BLOCK KIDS



The Anchorage Chapter of NAWIC #197 hit the ground running under the direction of Block Kids Chair Michelle Marshall and her awesome committee and was able to organize, schedule and hold four Block Kids contests in three (3) Anchorage Elementary Schools.

The fun started with a work party in which 13 NAWIC members gathered at the home of Tamie Taylor and began counting and sorting blocks. From there the ground work was set and Kathleen Bugbee hit the streets hard and got Rabbit Creek Elementary School scheduled as well as got the Carpenters Local #1281 as a sponsor for that School.

On February 3rd, twenty eight students descended on the gymnasium filled with enthusiasm to begin their projects. On March 3-6, 2005 I attended the Mid-year Board meetings. We started off at the Gaylord Texan Resort in Grapevine, Texas where we were provided a tour of the hotel where the 50th Anniversary Annual meeting will be held. Following the tour, we had a Strategic Planning meeting. Ladies, this is a great hotel. Not as big as the Opryland in Nashville so there won't be as much walking BUT, nice amenities, good food choices and friendly customer service agents. Make your plans now to attend the annual meeting on September 7-10, 2005.

The following morning, we set off for Garrett Creek Ranch in Paradise, Texas where I participated in the Executive Committee meeting as well as the board rap session, board meeting and a leadership skills training. The following is a brief listing of some of the actions that were taken. A more comprehensive list will be provided by the Regional Director Robin Langkamp.

Added a policy stating: The NAWIC Board will evaluate the financial status of the association on a yearly basis at the Pre-Convention Board Meeting. Based on the needs of the association, a dues increase not to exceed four (4) percent (rounded to the nearest dollar) may be proposed. In accordance with the bylaws, this proposal will be circulated at least 90 days before a vote is taken at the next Mid-Year Board Meeting. The effective date of any change would be on the 1st day of the next fiscal year following that vote. **This is NOT an automatic dues increase.**

Changed the dues policy so that all second year members will be renewed on a prorated basis using the members join date retroactive to November 1, 2004. **This will not effect the new member rate nor the amount of chapter dues. Only the National dues portion will be prorated the second year based upon a monthly rate.**

To circulate a proposed bylaw change, Article IX, Officers, Section 3C, Election of Officers: “The President-Elect, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer be elected by mail ballot, by a majority vote in accordance with voting procedures by the NAWIC Board of Directors”. **This is changing the vote from plurality to majority.**

Chapter Bylaws, Article VI, Section 7, Elections, “All Chapter elections may be conducted by mail ballot by a majority vote.” **This will be circulated but is a housekeeping measure to keep all the by-laws consistent.**

Accepted the recommendation of the NAWIC Sponsor Incentive Plan Task Force to provide an incentive for the chapters to solicit NAWIC sponsors. **Look for this plan soon, this is a great way that you can help NAWIC and your chapter by getting sponsors.**

Add to the NAWIC Officer Election Procedures and the NAWIC Officer Candidate Guidelines that in the event there is an open position for one or more of the national officers, the Executive Committee would act immediately to seek a suitable candidate for the open office.

Decision that the money collected by the NAWIC Office for the Tsunami Fund to be contributed through Habitat for Humanity and their efforts regarding the Tsunami.

To add a restricted fund line item on the balance sheet in the amount of \$50,000 from retained earnings to cover unforeseen circumstances resulting from convention hotel contract requirements.

To utilize \$3,000 currently slated for the on-line education to cover the purchase of three new NAWIC exhibit booths.

To increase the publication budget by \$5,000 in order to utilize the NAWIC *Image* to market a broader sector of the industry with the funds to be moved from the current on-line education line item.

Directed the Executive Vice President to increase the late renewal fee from \$15 - \$25.

Approved the charter withdrawal of the Bluenose Nova Scotia Chapter #318 chapter. ☹

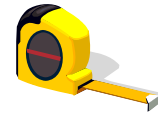
